

Pope Francis Preaches Heresy to Catholics

This past week, on Thursday morning, at his regular daily Mass, Pope Francis gave a very strange sermon as he tried to reconcile good and evil, but that cannot be done, although it is a typical Masonic ploy. Maybe Pope Francis is a Mason and not a Jesuit. Anyway, here is what he said, and I got this directly from Vatican Radio, so this is not someone's opinion. And the dateline is Thursday, June 9th, 2016, this year: **'Pope Francis warned on Thursday against an excessive rigidity** (I've never heard any of the Ten Commandments against excessive rigidity) **saying those within the Church who tell us it's this or nothing are heretics and not Catholics'**. His remarks came during the morning Mass on Thursday celebrated at the Santa Marta residence. So, Pope Francis, I challenge you to find somewhere in the gospel where teaching excessive rigidity, that is somehow a heresy. **'In his homily the Pope reflected on the harm caused by Churchmen who do the opposite of what they preach** (Well, I agree with you on that, Pope Francis, that would be hypocrisy; no one likes hypocrisy but the Pope always throws in some truth in order to squeeze in a lie) **'and urged them to free themselves from a rigid idealism** (Uh oh, rigid idealism? Jesus expressed rigid idealism when He said if you look at a woman with lust in your heart you have already committed adultery with her. That's not the same as what the Scribes and Pharisees were doing) **that prevents reconciliation between each other.'**

Now, I don't see anything in the Bible that says thou shalt not commit rigid idealism. **'Taking his cue from Jesus' warning to his disciples that unless their righteousness surpasses that of the Scribes and Pharisees they will not enter into the kingdom of heaven.'** Well, of course that's true, but where is righteousness the same as opposing rigid idealism? I don't see that part. **'Pope Francis stressed the importance of Christian realism.'** Uh oh, now, Pope Francis is saying that realism is greater than idealism. That is not Scriptural either!

'Jesus, he said, asks us to go beyond the law and love God and neighbor, (where is it that the law is against loving your neighbor? Jesus said that IS the law! That's one of the most important parts of the

law: thou shalt love the Lord your God and your neighbor as yourself. All the commandments are based on that law, Jesus said. I don't know, Pope Francis? Have you read the Bible?) ***stressing that whoever is angry with their brother will be liable to judgment.*** Well, that's absolutely true, Pope Francis. You say one truth in order to squeeze in a lie, as I said before.

'In addition, these people had seen the rigidity of those Scribes and Pharisees and when a prophet came to give them a bit of joy (prophets don't give 'bits of joy', Pope Francis! Where did you learn that nonsense?) they, the Scribes and Pharisees, persecuted them and even murdered them; there was no place for prophets there. And Jesus said to them, to the Pharisees, you have killed the prophets you have persecuted the prophets, those who were bringing fresh air.' Pope Francis, the prophets never bring 'fresh air' or a 'bit of joy' as you say. I can tell you what the message of a prophet is and it's the same as it has always been! It's a very simple sentence: ***'repent for the kingdom of God is at hand!'*** Let me ask you, Pope Francis, let's take for example, John the Baptist: did he accuse Herod of 'idealism', of 'rigidity'? I don't think so! He accused him of adultery. He wasn't trying to bring him a 'bit of joy' or some kind of pleasantness. He was telling him the hard facts of life! That's why Herod had John beheaded!

The same way with Saint Thomas More. What did Saint Thomas More tell Henry the Eighth that caused him to lose his head? He told Henry the Eighth the same thing: that he was committing adultery! He didn't try to bring him some 'fresh air' or a 'bit of joy'. That is a lie, Pope Francis! You are perverting the Gospel. You tell a little truth to get in your lie. You are the False Prophet! That's why you can't tell the truth about prophets; you bring a false prophecy to your Church but the good news is, according to Scripture, you, Wormwood, are only going to lead one third of the people astray. So, there is some good news along with the bad news today.
